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

#### **DIRECTOR BIOS**



### Grisel Pren Monje - Artistic Director & Choreographer

Grisel Pren Monje is a director, choreographer and teaching artist. She was born and raised in Cancun, Mexico and began her dance training at a young age in local dance studios. She became a professional dancer and entertainer in many of the Resorts in the Riviera Maya. In 2007, Grisel moved to the United States to study ballet, jazz, and musical theater in New York City under the International student visa program for dance and continued her dance training in renowned schools such as Broadway Dance Center, Steps on Broadway, and Alvin Ailey. She has performed and choreographed for several dance companies throughout her dance career and made her Off Broadway debut in 2012 with Zapata! The Musical at the New York Musical Festival with a principal role. In 2008, she joined the Calpulli Mexican Dance Company. She's toured with the company, both nationally and internationally. She is the co-writer for Calpulli's newest production Monarcas. As a teaching artist, Grisel works toward building an appreciation for dance and the arts by providing culturally enriched dance training and classes for children, adolescents, and adults. She currently works as a Dance Teaching Artist for Society of the Educational Arts, Center for Modern Dance Education, Grunin Performing Arts Academy, New Jersey Performing Arts Center and Calpulli Community. Grisel holds a Mexican Folk Dance teacher certification from El Ballet Folklorico de Mexico de Amalia Hernandez, a Mexican Folk Dance and Raza Technique Training Diploma from El Ballet Folklórico de la Universidad de Colima de el maestro Rafael Zamarripa and has attended and completed Traditional Mexican Dance workshops and a Stage Production training program in La Escuela Nacional de Danza Folklórica in Mexico City.



## George Saenz - Music Director

Trombonist/Multi-instrumentalist, composer, arranger and educator, George Saenz is originally from Laredo, Texas. In May 2005, he moved to Boston, Massachusetts to study brass performance and jazz composition at Berklee College of Music. Since graduating in 2008, he performed with many award-winning artists such as Gloria Estefan and The Edge (U2), Ruben Blades, McCoy Tyner at the Montreal Jazz Festival, Bob Mintzer at the Berklee Concert Jazz Orchestra, The Cornerstone Chorale and Brass Ensemble at Carnegie Hall, Maria Schneider and The Berklee Concert Jazz Orchestra, and Phil Wilson's Rainbow Band at the Beantown Jazz Festival. In addition to playing the trombone, Mr. Saenz is also a talented button accordionist, bassist, pianist, guitarist and composer/arranger, having an original arrangement of the jazz standard "I Love You" be debuted at the Heineken Jazz Festival in Puerto Rico in 2008. Mr. Saenz now resides and works in New York City, working as a freelance musician, composer/arranger and educator



## Gabriela Garcia - Dramaturg & Choreographer

Gabriela Garcia is an artist dividing her time between the theater, dance, commercial and education industries. She holds a BA in Performing Arts from Saint Mary's College of California, and is Co-Founder and Director of R. Evolución Latina (RL), a nonprofit organization making a diff erence through the arts. Some of her theater credits are Half Time the musical directed and choreographed by Jerry Mitchell, CHICAGO The Musical Mexico City and Vienna (Velma Kelly), CHICAGO Broadway (cast member and dance captain), CHICAGO Düsseldorf (Dance Associate), and Sweeney Todd at the Barrow Street Theater (Movement Associate). As a choreographer, she served as Associate Choreographer for Public Works' musical production of Twelfth Night. She has created works for the Joff rey Ballet School's NYC Jazz and Contemporary summer intensive performances, BC/EFA benefi ts, R.Evolución Latina's Choreographer Festival and for Preludio Cultural Association in Peru, where she choreographed a production of Sweet Charity and CHICAGO. Her ballet and theater dance classes have reached schools in Sweden, Peru, Mexico, China, Germany and other countries. In New York she has taught at institutions such as Ellison Ballet, PACE University, Ithaca College, and was co-coordinator for the Joff rey Ballet School's Joff rey Ensemble. Professional dance companies include Tanzforum Koeln (Germany) and Pacifi c Northwest Ballet. TV credits include: Succession, Jessica Jones. Film credits: In The Heights, Whatever Lola Wants (Tribeca fi Im festival) and Enchanted. As a voiceover actor, her voice can be heard in numerous TV commercials and radio spots for the US national Hispanic market as well as Spanish language audio books. #### **SYNOPSIS**

### Act I

## 1860-1862

Our story begins in the early 1860s at the Atlixcayotl festival in the flower-covered town of Atlixco, Puebla. A young soldier proclaims his loyalty to Mexican President Benito Juárez and the efforts to implement laws that separated church and state. Nearby, a friar and members of the Mexican elite stand against his proclamation. After a tense moment, the celebration continues. Concerned about the impact the new laws could have on their authority, the friar and the elite prepare a message for their European allies.

The Emperor of France, Napoleon III, receives the message of Mexico's civil war and its growing debt to his country. The friars propose to Napoleon III a French monarchy in Mexico to serve their interests and those of the elite. They describe all the riches that he and France will gain. Convinced, Napoleon III invades Mexico and proclaims Maximilian, Archduke of Austria, the new emperor of Mexico.

### 1864

The newly appointed Emperors of Mexico, Charlotte of Belgium and Maximilian, arrive in Mexico City at the capitol buildings of the Zócalo. They are greeted by Mexican aristocrats who exuberantly demonstrate support for the French monarchy hopeful for the opportunities it will create for them. The Mexican aristocrats showcase their imitation of French dance and are surprised when the empress displays interest in Mexico's native traditions.

### Act II

#### 1862

The bright head piece honors the Quetzal bird, and its connection to the Aztec gods. The dances proudly represent Puebla, patriotism, and loyalty to President Benito Juarez as a leader against French intervention. At the same time, the strongest army of the time approaches the city of Puebla with its united force of French soldiers and foreign mercenaries.

On April 28, 1862, just a few days before the Battle of Puebla, a small Mexican army was unable to hold back the French forces at the Battle of Acultzingo, where our young soldier was mortally wounded. La Maringuilla, a mystical healer, performs a ritual of Totonac and African descent to heal the soldier to fight another day.

The soldier says goodbye to his loved ones. They are aware that the Mexican army has few soldiers and, even with commoners in arms, is much smaller than the approaching French army. A defeat seems certain, but they persist with courage. The soldier arrives at the Fort of Loreto and Guadalupe. On May 5, 1862, outnumbered but not out spirited, the Mexicans fought bravely and without end. To their own disbelief, the Mexican soldiers are triumphant. The strongest army in the world was defeated today in Puebla.

The people of Puebla celebrate their amazing feat by returning to their families and full of hope for the years to come.

### **SINOPSIS**

### Acto I

### 1860-1862

Nuestra historia comienza a principios de la década de 1860 en la fiesta de Atlixcayotl, en el pueblo floreado de Atlixco, Puebla. Un joven soldado proclama su lealtad al presidente mexicano Benito Juárez y a los esfuerzos por implantar leyes que separan Iglesia y Estado. Cerca de él, un fraile y miembros de la élite mexicana se oponen a su proclamación. Tras un momento de tensión, la celebración continúa. Preocupados por el impacto que las nuevas leyes podrían tener en su autoridad, el fraile y la élite preparan un mensaje para sus aliados europeos.

El emperador de Francia, Napoleón III, recibe el mensaje de la guerra civil de México y de su creciente deuda con su país. Los frailes proponen a Napoleón III una monarquía francesa en México que sirva a sus intereses y a los de la élite. Le describen todas las riquezas que él y Francia obtendrán. Convencido, Napoleón III invade México y proclama a Maximiliano, archiduque de Austria, nuevo emperador de México.

## 1864

Los recién nombrados emperadores de México, Carlota de Bélgica y Maximiliano, llegan a Ciudad de México a los edificios capitolinos del Zócalo. Son recibidos por aristócratas mexicanos que manifiestan exuberantemente su apoyo a la monarquía francesa con la esperanza de las oportunidades que les creará. Los aristócratas mexicanos muestran su imitación de la danza francesa y se sorprenden cuando la emperatriz muestra interés por las tradiciones autóctonas de México.

### Acto II

## 1862

El brillante tocado honra el ave Quetzal, y su conexión con los dioses aztecas. Las danzas representan con orgullo a Puebla, el patriotismo y la lealtad al Presidente Benito Juárez como líder contra la intervención francesa. Al mismo tiempo, el ejército más fuerte de la época se acerca a la ciudad de Puebla con su fuerza unida de soldados franceses y mercenarios extranjeros.

El 28 de abril de 1862, pocos días antes de la batalla de Puebla, un pequeño ejército mexicano es incapaz de contener a las fuerzas francesas en la batalla de Acultzingo, donde nuestro joven soldado resulta herido de muerte. La Maringuilla, una curandera mística, realiza un ritual de ascendencia Totonaca y Africana para sanar al soldado y que pueda luchar un día más.

El soldado se despide de sus seres queridos. Son conscientes de que el ejército mexicano tiene pocos soldados e, incluso con plebeyos en armas, es mucho más pequeño que el ejército francés que se aproxima. La derrota parece segura, pero persisten con valor. El soldado llega al Fuerte de Loreto y Guadalupe. El 5 de mayo de 1862, superados en número pero no en espíritu, los mexicanos luchan valientemente y sin descanso. Asombrados de sí mismos, los soldados mexicanos triunfan. El ejército más fuerte del mundo ha sido derrotado hoy en Puebla.

Los poblanos celebran su asombrosa hazaña volviendo con sus familias y llenos de esperanza para los años venideros.

## **CHOREOGRAPHERS**

## Juan Castaño, Executive Director and Co-Founder

Juan Castaño co-founded Calpulli Mexican Dance Company with the vision of celebrating and serving the Mexican and Mexican-American community across the USA. Mr. Castaño, a native of El Paso, TX, holds an MBA in General Management from the Metropolitan College of New York. He also holds a BA in Chemistry and studied Latin American Studies while at Grinnell College in Iowa. There he also began his studies of folk dance with student instructor Alicia Gonzalez. He continued his training in NYC with several choreographers most notably Noemy Hernandez, Daniel Jaquez, and Alberto Lopez. With over 20 years of dance experience in Mexican folk dance, Mr. Castaño is a Master Teacher with the YoungArts Foundation. In recent years, he is a guest choreographer for Calpulli Mexican Dance Company, setting pieces for several productions and co-writing "Puebla: The Story of Cinco de Mayo" and "Navidad: A Mexican-American Christmas," with the latter pulling from his upbringing on the US-Mexico border. He studied Arts Administration as continuing education at New York University and is a certified Non-Profit Financial Professional via the Fiscal Management Associates. Mr. Castaño is a certified Project Management Professional (PMP) via the Project Management Institute. Since 2003, Mr. Castaño has worked as a managing director, teaching artist, grant writing, and producer in the arts and beyond. Specifically, he is currently an Associate Director at Pfizer supporting research and development projects. Castaño is inspired by the quality of the artistic and cultural programming by Calpulli, with whom he is still a dancer. Accessibility of high quality community programs, serving hundreds of students and families, is also a driving force for his dedication to the performing arts.

## Alberto C. Lopez Herrera, Director of Arts-In-Education & Co-Founder

Mr. Lopez Herrera is a Choreographer, Costume Designer & Maker, and Teaching Artist with over 30 years of experience in Mexican Folklorico. Originally from San Antonio Chiltepec in Puebla, Mr. Lopez Herrera began his studies of Mexican folkloric dance at the age of 12 at the Centro Escolar Benito Juárez de Acatlán de Osorio. He completed the National Dance Institute's intensive Teaching Artist training in New York. Mr. Lopez Herrera was a dancer and choreographer with several groups and companies working with distinguished choreographers Francisco Nevarez and Clarissa Marcovich. He continues to create traditional garments used in Mexican folkloric dance. With great attention to detail, he designs garments from across Mexico. His pivotal role in costuming can be seen throughout the company's repertoire. Under his Artistic Direction, Calpulli Mexican Dance Company performed at noted venues including Jacob's Pillow Dance Festival (Inside/Out Series), Wortham Center (Houston, TX), Humboldt State University, the Kingdom of Bahrain, Penn State Erie, and Lincoln Center Out of Doors, where Dance Critic Brian Siebert hailed Calpulli a "terrific company" after its performance. Mr. Lopez Herrera was named "Star of Queens" by the Queens Courier for his artistic accomplishments and commitment to community arts programming. He was also featured by People en Español in the program "New American Voices" and is a Crain's NY 2022 Notable Hispanic Leader. He was co-choreographer with Joshua Bergasse and dramaturg of the off-Broadway production "A Crossing." Most recently, Mr. Lopez Herrera was commissioned by the Ft. Wayne Dance Collective in Indiana for contemporary and folkloric dances telling dia de muertos-inspired stories. Mr. Lopez was also Calpulli Mexican Dance Company's Artistic Director from 2013 to 2023.

## **Javier Dzul**

Javier Dzul grew up in the jungles of southern Mexico, performing Maya ritual dance and studying ancient Maya teachings under the direction of his parents. Formal dance training began at the Universidad de Veracruz, followed by the Ballet Nacional de Cuba and the Martha Graham School. Javier performed as a Principal Dancer with Ballet Nacional de Mexico and Ballet Folklorico de Mexico and in New York with the Martha Graham Dance Company, Pearl Lang Dance Theater, Alvin Ailey Repertory Ensemble and American Indian Dance Theatre. Javier created Dzul Dance in 2003. He and his diverse company of performers have been presented throughout the world, garnering reviews that hail Dzul's "acrobatic wizardry" (Attitude: The Dancers' Magazine) and his ability to turn his dancers of "remarkable elasticity into creatures of the air as well as of the earth." (The New York Times). Javier was commissioned by Calpulli in Spring 2018 to create "Xibalba" for the production Boda Mexicana.

## **Noemy Hernandez**

Noemy Hernandez is a passionate choreographer, artistic director, and arts administrator. Ms. Hernandez earned Certificate in Arts Management from the UC Irvine Paul Merage School of Business And Claire Trevor School of the Arts and a B.F.A. in Dance from the University of California, Irvine with a Choreography Specialization. She works

extensively in New York and Los Angeles. As Artistic Director of Calpulli Mexican Dance Company in New York City through 2014, she choreographed for The Brooklyn Philharmonic and collaborated with Grammy Award-winning artist Arturo O'Farrill & his Jazz Orchestra. Her choreography was presented at the Bahrain Grand Prix in the Kingdom of Bahrain, the New York Metropolitan Museum, the Brooklyn Museum, Jacob's Pillow Dance Festival, and NYC's Shakespeare in the Park. She coached finalists for the Young Arts Foundation, and has worked as a Teaching Artist in public schools and for several non-profit organizations. Ms. Hernandez co-founded the nonprofit organization, Everyday Arts. Ms. Hernandez was Calpulli Mexican Dance Company's second Artistic Director from 2009 to 2013.

### **Carlos Islas**

Originally from Mexico City, Carlos Islas began dancing at age six and was 12 when he entered the Escuela Nacional de Danza Folklórica, where he served as a representative group dancer for 6 years. Mr. Islas graduated with a degree in Mexican folkloric dance from the Instituto Nacional de Bellas Artes de México. He performed with several companies in different important forums in Mexico such Palacio de Bellas Artes, Auditorio Nacional, Teatro de la Ciudad, Teatro de la Danza, Estadio Azteca y Centro Nacional de las Artes to name a few. In 2005 he founded "Estampas de México" dance company with which he has represented Mexico in more than 20 countries on 4 continents. He has worked as a teacher and choreographer at the Escuela del Ballet Folklórico de México de Amalia Hernández, Academia de la Danza Mexicana, y Escuela Nacional de Danza Folklórica. He has judged dance competitions in the Philippines, South Korea and Romania.

## **DANCERS**

José María Rojas is a professional dancer and teacher of traditional Argentine folklore originally from Paraná, Entre Ríos, Argentina.
