Spring was commissioned by and performed with the New Jersey Symphony in 2022 for their 100th Anniversary Season. The original 1944 choreography for Aaron Copland's Appalachian Spring was, of course, by Martha Graham, and is recognized as one of the seminal dance works of the Modern Dance movement. Deeply familiar with Graham's Appalachian Spring from having performed it with the Martha Graham company, but also connected to the familiar tune of the Shaker hymn "Simple Gifts", I felt compelled to address the themes of American hope and optimism so embedded in the provenance of this work. Graham's Appalachian Spring, created during World War II as a patriotic ode to the American pioneering spirit, presents a retrospective, and antiquated, image of hope and optimism. For our Spring, we focused on ideas of renewal: in nature, in family generations, and in more recent stories of American hope and spiritual optimism drawn from the cast members' family histories. The characters can be seen as generations of a family, or as embodiments of characters at different stages of their life, along with a figure who represents the continuity of spirit between generations. - SMP

### **About Nimbus:**

Nimbus Dance bridges the gap between world-class performances and community engagement by presenting work that challenges, speaks to, and elevates the core beliefs of its diverse audience. Founded in 2005 by visionary Artistic Director Samuel Pott (former soloist with Martha Graham Dance Company) and based in Jersey City, Nimbus stands at the forefront of excellence in the arts, civic engagement, and equitable impact. With a highly physical and visually engaging aesthetic, Nimbus' international company of dancers "split the difference between traditionalism and modernism... A Nimbus piece can pivot from ballet to Broadway to Beyoncé in a few beats." (Tris McCall, Jersey City Times). The company performs on tour nationally and throughout the greater New Jersey/New York region, impacting 16,000 people each year. Recently, Nimbus performed with the Boston Symphony Orchestra at Tanglewood and is humbled by support from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Geraldine R. Dodge Foundation, and O'Donnell Green Music and Dance Foundation among others. @NimbusDance

Samuel Pott (Artistic Director, New York, NY) (he/him) founded Nimbus in 2005 drawing on a deeply held personal belief in the value that the arts can play in bringing together people and communities. Under his direction, the organization has developed a school that serves over 400 students, enriched Jersey City's vibrant cultural scene, toured nationally, and gained its own building. Nimbus Arts Center at The Lively, which opened in 2020. His emotionally evocative choreography has been shown at venues including Brooklyn Academy of Music (BAM Fisher). New Jersey Performing Arts Center, and Jacob's Pillow Dance Festival. His collaborations have included work with many esteemed contemporary artists working in new music, including composers Daniel Bernard Roumain, Samson Young, Judd Greenstein, Aaron Parks, and Qasim Nagyi. Mr. Pott has received three Choreography Fellowships from the New Jersey State Council on the Arts and was named a Distinguished Teaching Artist by the Council in 2012. He was one of 25 arts leaders nationally selected for the Association of Performing Arts Presenters' (APAP) inaugural Leadership Fellows Program, serves on the Dance Advisory Council for New Jersey Performing Arts Center and the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee for ArtPride NJ, and is a cofounder of the Jersey City Arts Council.

Mr. Pott danced as a soloist with the Martha Graham Dance Company, performing in iconic roles-the Husbandman in Appalachian Spring, Agamemnon in Clytemnestra, and Adam in Embattled Garden-and new choreographic works created by a range of leading contemporary choreographers including Larry Kegwin, Ann Bogart, Robert Wilson, and Lar Lubovitch. Prior to joining the Graham company, Mr. Pott performed as a lead dancer with American Repertory Ballet, Oakland Ballet, and Savage Jazz Dance Company, in a wide range of new and classical repertory.

**Paul Salerni**'s (conductor) music "pulses with life, witty musical ideas and instrumental color" (*The Philadelphia Inquirer*), and has been described by the *New York Times* as "impressive" and "playful". Henry Fogel (*Fanfare*) has said "It is...music that sings and dances."

Salerni's one-act opera **Tony Caruso's Final Broadcast,** with a libretto by Dana Gioia, won the National Opera Association's Chamber Opera Competition. A definitive recording was released on Naxos in 2010. His second one-act, **The Life and Love of Joe Coogan**, is adapted from a Dick Van Dyke TV Show episode. In March 2019, Salerni and Gioia saw the premiere of a one-act dance opera entitled **Haunted**. Salerni's chamber music and songs appear on the Albany, Bridge, and New Focus labels. Last season he was the Composer in Residence for Brooklyn's Concerts on the Slope chamber music series. His several orchestral commissions include works for the New Haven Symphony, the Allentown Symphony, the San Diego Chamber Orchestra, the Lehigh Valley Chamber Orchestra, and the Northeast Pennsylvania Philharmonic. He is published by Presser, Alfred, Fischer, and North Star.

Salerni is the NEH Distinguished Chair in the Humanities at Lehigh University where he conducts the Lehigh University Philharmonic. Salerni received a Ph.D. in composition from Harvard University, where he studied with Earl Kim. As the leading expert on Kim's music, Salerni has a long history of collaboration as guest pianist and lecturer with the Sejong Soloists. He has performed Kim's music with the ensemble at the Seoul Arts Center, the Great Mountains Festival (Korea), at the Kennedy Center, the 92<sup>nd</sup> St. Y, and the Aspen Music Festival. He is featured as a resource, a performer, and an interviewee in **Earl.**, a new documentary about Kim's life by filmmaker Ty Kim.

A dedicated educator, Salerni is the recipient of the Stabler Award, Lehigh University's most valued acknowledgement of excellence in teaching. His service to the larger community includes seven years' service on the Board of Directors of the Suzuki Association of the Americas. For two of those years, he served as Chair. Salerni is married to opera and stage director Laura Johnson, and often writes for, and performs with, their two sons, violinist Domenic (Attacca Quartet) and percussionist Miles (Philadelphia Ballet).

**Dawn Marie Bazemore** (choreographer), a Brooklyn-bred wife, mother, artist and dance educator, is currently an Associate Professor in the Department of Theatre and Dance at Rowan University leading courses in modern dance technique, choreography and world dance forms. Dawn Marie is a former member of Philadanco and has also performed featured roles in Broadway and regional musical theater productions. Her performance of *Strange Fruit*, choreographed by the late Dr. Pearl Primus, is currently on display at the National Museum of African American History and Culture.

In addition to collaborating with her own collective, Dawn Marie has served as an Artist in Residence at Virginia Commonwealth University, University of North Carolina School for the Arts and Marymount Manhattan College and has been commissioned to choreograph for Philadanco and Nimbus Dance Works. In 2018, she was selected to be a Jacob's Pillow Ann & Weston Hicks Choreography Fellow and was the 2019 Dance Visions Artist in Residence at the Performance Garage. Dawn Marie's creative work tackles the socio-political concerns of the communities to which she identifies, which she has also addressed in her essay Dance and Activism: The Practice and Impact of Sociopolitical Concert Dance published in the online journal The Dancer-Citizen.

Dawn Marie trained at the Alvin Ailey American Dance Center, Dance Theatre of Harlem, Ballet Academy East, Covenant Ballet Theatre of Brooklyn and the Fournier-Grego Performance Center. She is a graduate of the NYC High School for Performing Arts and has earned a BFA from SUNY Purchase and an MFA from Hollins University. Currently, she is a Doctoral Student in the Dance Education Ed.D. program at Columbia University's Teachers College where her research is focused on the leadership and wellness practices of Black women dance leaders in higher education. Dawn Marie has been awarded the Helen Tamiris Award for Excellence in Dance, the 2018 ACHI Magazine Inc. Trailblazer of the Year award and the 2021 Diversity in the Arts Award from Rowan University.

Ballet Guild of the Lehigh Valley, founded in 1958 by Marjorie Berlin Fink, is a non-profit 501(c) (3) organization dedicated to fostering the art of theatre dance, primarily classical ballet, through education and performances. Serving as the umbrella organization for the Pennsylvania Youth Ballet school and performing company, the Guild has been known for its superior ballet training, as well as first-class performances with guest artists from the world's leading ballet companies. Classes are held for ages three through adult during the school year and the summer. Students studying at the Ballet Guild learn in a nurturing and professional environment while enjoying the outstanding opportunities afforded by the best in classical ballet, jazz, and modern dance training. They are invited to audition for the Guild's annual production of *The Nutcracker* at Zoellner Arts Center, Lehigh University, as well as its annual Spring Ballet and other productions that may occur throughout the year.

LeighAnn Curd (Dancer/Rehearsal Director, Orange County, NY) (she/ her) received her BFA from the Boston Conservatory on the Anamarie Sarazin Scholarship. While there, she was featured in new works created by Luis Fuenté, Gianni DiMarco, and Kathryn Posin, and had the privilege of performing classic works by dance legends like Antony Tudor and Martha Graham. She has performed as a guest principal in Tony Williams' Ballet Rox and Urban Nutcracker with Opera Boston and has done freelance work with XT Danscollective. From 2012-2014, Ms. Curd had the opportunity to study and perform abroad in London, UK. LeighAnn is a founding member of the Brooklyn-based dance company Inclined Dance Project, where she danced for 10 years and took on the role of Rehearsal Director during her final seasons with the company. In the Fall of 2017, Ms. Curd joined Nimbus2 and was promoted to the main company by the Spring of 2018. During her time at Nimbus, she has had the pleasure of dancing lead roles in works choreographed by Artistic Director Samuel Pott, as well as premiered works by Dawn Marie Bazemore, Sofia Nappi, and Kristen Klein. Ms. Curd is a Teaching Artist and the Director of the Pre-Professional Program and Nimbus Youth Ensemble at The School of Nimbus. LeighAnn was the Costume Coordinator for the company from 2017-2023. The 2023/2024 season marks LeighAnn's seventh year with Nimbus Dance and her first year as Rehearsal Director for the company.

**Johnny Del Jesus** (Dancer, Boston, MA) (he/him) started dancing at The Tony Williams Dance Center at 9 years old. He continued his dance training into his adolescent and adult years. He attended Boston Arts

Academy, part of the class of 2018, where he trained under the direction of William McLaughlin and Sheryl Thomas. He got to work with many amazing teachers and choreographers such as Tatiana Obeso, Ruka White, Heather Stewart, Nathan Trice, Kirven Douthit-Boyd, and many more. While in high school he continued his dance studies during the summer at Earl Mosely's Institute of the Arts and Bates Dance Festival. After high school, he continued on to George Mason University where he studied dance for an additional four years. Here, he received training from many different artists and teachers, including Susan Shields, Roger Jeffrey, Christopher D'Amboiuse, Daniel Joyce, Shaun Boyle-Darcy, and many others. He also had the amazing opportunities to work with different choreographers and dancers alike such as Alexander Hille, Pier Loup, Jean Emile, Fiona Jopp, Hope Boykin, Jae Neal, and Mora Amina Parker. He was privileged to perform works by choreographers like Camille A. Brown and Kyle Abraham. He graduated in May 2022 with a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Dance from George Mason University. He is super excited and grateful to be with the main company for his first season.

Catherine Escueta (Dancer, Eatontown, New Jersey) (she/her) began her dance training at the Academy of Dance Arts under the direction of Nick and Shayne Mishoe. She continued her studies at SUNY Purchase College, graduating summa cum laude with degrees in Dance Performance and Arts Management. While at Purchase, Catherine spent a semester studying abroad at the Korea National University of Arts in Seoul. She has worked with choreographers such as Rosalind Newman, Lamine Thiam, Hillary Pearson, Sung Hoon Kim, Autumn Eckman, and Jenelle Figgins. Catherine traveled to Guatemala with JUNTOS Collective in 2019 and continued to research dance as a transformative outreach tool with Rehabilitation Through the Arts (RTA). This is her second season with Nimbus.

Agustin Gomes (Dancer, São José dos Campos, Brazil) (he/him) began his professional dance training at Instituto Marco de Dança in his hometown. There he competed and placed in many dance competitions including the XXVIII International Dance Seminar of Brasilia, where he was prized 1st Place Overall and received full scholarships to train with the prestigious Alonzo King LINES Ballet and Lamondance. During his time at Lamondance (Canada), Gomes worked with esteemed choreographers Kirsten Wicklund, Noam Gagnon and Alysa Pires. After that he joined New York Dance Project under the direction of Davis Robertson and Nicole Duffy as a company member where he performed Carmen Suites restaged by Sonia Calero Alonso as well as pieces by Gerald Arpino. Agustin then joined Ballet Hispanico second company and performed pieces by Annabelle Lopez Ochoa, Gustavo Ramirez Sansano, Michelle Manzanales, Eduardo Vilaro, Pedro Ruiz and many others. This is Agustin's first season with Nimbus.

**Shayla Hutton** (Dancer, Kelowna, BC Canada) (she/her) began her dance training at the age of four with The Canadian School of Ballet. After graduating high school, she moved to New York City to further her dance training at Joffrey Ballet School. There she was asked to join and perform with the Joffrey Ballet Concert Group under the direction of Davis Robertson. Ms. Hutton has frequently performed in cities across the United States and internationally in Italy and Canada. She

has worked closely with ballet masters Stacy Caddell, Sam Meredith, Brian McSween, and Nicole Duffy. Ms. Hutton has performed in original works created by choreographers Africa Guzman, Gabrielle Lamb, Roger C. Jeffrey, Gary Chryst, Julie Bour, Jean Emile, Tyler Gilstrap and Davis Robertson. She has also performed signature works by George Balanchine, Gerald Arpino and Donald Byrd. Ms. Hutton graduated from the Joffrey Ballet School in 2017 and is looking forward to her seventh season with Nimbus.

Caleb Mansor (Dancer, Hatboro, PA) (he/him) began his dance training at the age of twelve as a student of Metropolitan Ballet Academy and Company in Jenkintown, Pennsylvania, where he first fell in love with dance, specifically ballet. There, he had the opportunity to perform classical ballets as well as works by choreographers such as Kate Sharpetowska, Kanji Segawa, Sarah Mettin, and Tommie-Waheed Evans. Upon graduating high school, he attended George Mason University School of Dance where he completed his BFA in Dance, tried his hand at dancemaking, and was able to learn and perform dances by choreographers such as Lucinda Childs, Rafael Bonachela, Christopher d'Amboise, Hope Boykin, and Larry Keigwin among others. Caleb is very excited for his second season with the company.

Tamir Rios (Dancer, Jersey City, NJ) (he/him) - Jersey City native, Tamir Rios, has been a dancer for nearly 14 years of his life. Rios is versatile in many forms of dance while mainly focusing on his ballet and modern techniques. In 2017, Rios was offered the New Jersey Governor's Award in dance arts during his high school career, where he majored in dance within the performing arts. As a high school student, Rios had the door opened to train at Earl Mosley's Diversity of Dance, in Kent, Connecticut. Rios went on to continue his studies at Montclair State University shortly after.At Montclair State University. Rios has trained with a handful of choreographers from Maxine Steinman, Earl Frederick Mosley, Antonio Brown, Alwin Nikolais, Christian VonHoward, Bill T. Jones, Stacey Tookey, and many more. In 2020, Rios became a founding member of "Zeitgeist" Dance Theatre". Rios found himself working under the guidance of artistic directors Francisco Gella and Yusha-Marie Sorzano of "Zeitgeist Dance Theatre". Rios has also worked with Jamie Carabetta of "Ponybox Dance Theatre". Rios plans to use his everyday connections and skills to create new stories with the obstacles and challenges he comes into contact with. This is his second season with Nimbus Dance.

Victoria Santaguida (Dancer, Toronto, Canada) (she/her) began training competitively at age three under Sheona Bell. Ms. Santaguida has completed up to the Advanced II level of Ballet Examinations of the Cecchetti Technique. She attended summer programs at The Juilliard School, the National Ballet of Canada, the Joffrey Ballet School, and Ballet Hispanico. Upon graduating from the Regional Arts Program at Cawthra Park Secondary School, Ms. Santaguida moved to New York City and worked closely under ballet masters Stacy Caddell, Nicole Duffy, Sam Meredith, and Brian McSween. Ms. Santaguida has been featured in works by Gerald Arpino and George Balanchine and in original works by Africa Guzman, Dwight Rhoden, Roger C. Jeffrey, Gabrielle Lamb, and Davis Robertson. She has danced with the Joffrey Ballet Concert group under the direction of Davis Robertson and with Complexions Contemporary

Ballet under the direction of Dwight Rhoden and Desmond Richardson. Ms. Santaguida is currently in her seventh season as a company dancer with Nimbus Dance and also serves as the Director of the Junior Youth Ensemble for the School of Nimbus.

Kanon Sugino (Dancer, New York City, NY) (she/her) is a Japanese-American dancer and choreographer born and raised in New York. After graduating from Fiorello H. 
